MASS SCHEDULE:

Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated on the 4th Sunday of every month (no baptism during lent). Baptismal Preparation class is held on the Thursday before baptism at 6pm. This class is mandatory. Please register at least one week in advance of the class through the Religious education Office or the parish Office.

SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION IS CELEBRATED ONE HALF HOUR BEFORE EACH WEEKEND MASS.

Marriage Law of the Diocese requires a six month preparation period before marriage. Couples must attend a pre-marriage seminar. In this Diocese there are no evening weddings on Saturday It is necessary to see the priest before setting a date.

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

The Rite of Sending

At the conclusion of the period of the catechumenate, a rite of sending the catechumens to their election by the bishop may be celebrated in parishes wherever this seems beneficial or desirable. When election will take place in the parish, this rite is not used.

We continue our series on Judges in the Bible with Deborah:

<u>Deborah/Barak</u> (Deborah = Ephraim and Barak = Naphtali)

Deborah the wife of Lappidoth was a prophetess and a judge. She would sit under Deborah's palm tree between Bethel and Ramah.

Once again, the Israelites offended God and He allowed the Israelites to fall under the power of Jabin, the Canaanite king.

Deborah and her general, Barak (Naphtali), defeated Sisera, the general of the army of Canaanite King Jabin of Hazor at the Battle of Kishon near Mt Tabor.

- Sisera fled from Deborah and Barak to the tent of Jeal, the wife of the Kenite Heber. The Kenites and Jabin were at peace.
- Sisera was slain by Jael driving a tent peg into his head. Thus God humbled the Canaanite king Jabin until the Israelites destroyed him.

The Song of Deborah (Judges chapter 15) recounts the great victory.

Barak is listed among the "Heroes of the Faith" in Heb 11:32.

Enemies: Jabin, Canaanite king of Hazor Sisera, general and vassal of Jabin; may have been a Hittite.

Period of oppression: 20 years

Period of quiet: 40 years

Scriptures: Judges 4:1-5:31; 1 Sam 12:11; Heb 11:32

First Sunday of Lent Clear Conscience

Usually, the first reading has something in common with the gospel. Today's however, has more in common with the second reading from St. Peter. They both talk about Noah and the ark, where the few good people were saved by going through the water. Peter compares that to the waters of Baptism, in which we are saved by God. He also has an interesting image of Jesus "preaching to the spirits in prison." It refers to the fallen angels whose disobedience lead the rest of the population to turn away from God. Just as God washed away the evil of the world in the waters of the flood, so the waters of Baptism made us into a new people who have clear consciences, both because God has forgiven our sins and because we promise to follow only Him.

That leads to the Gospel, where Jesus is tempted by Satan. But unlike the people of Noah's time, Jesus does not fall to the temptations. Instead, he comes out of the desert, proclaiming that the Kingdom of God is near. He tells us to repent and believe in the good news.

That means we have a choice to make: Do we accept this kingdom and repent, or do we ignore our baptism and do what we want? We may say that we are willing to repent, but do we do anything about it? Do we still have a clear conscience when we think of how much time we spend getting to know Jesus? Ever pray or read the bible outside of church? Do we spend near as much on the poor, as we do for movies, hobbies, video games, or drinks? Do we ever tell anyone about the kingdom and what Jesus has done for us?

Next time you see a rainbow, think about the covenant that God made with Noah. Just as God's promises get better and better till the coming of Jesus, we are challenged to be more and more like Him. Are you satisfied with just a promise that God won't destroy us all in a flood? Or are you ready to live the New Covenant that Jesus promises to those who will follow him?
