Saint Patrick, who lived during the 5th century, is the patron St. of Ireland and its national apostle. Born in Roman Britain, he was kidnapped and brought to Ireland as a slave at 16. He later escaped, but returned to Ireland and was credited with bringing Christianity to its people.

In the centuries following Patrick's death (believed to have been on March 17, 461), the mythology surrounding his life became ever more ingrained in the Irish culture: Perhaps the most well-known legend of Saint Patrick is the Irish is that he explained the Holy Trinity (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit) using the three leaves of the native Irish clover, the Shamrock.

Daylight Saving Time

The underlying reason for Daylight Saving Time—or "summer time" as it's called in other places around the world - is to make better use of the daylight. Thus, clocks are changed in the spring to, essentially, shift an hour of daylight from the morning to the evening. Then, in the fall, we return to Standard Time and shift an hour of daylight back from the evening to the morning.

But first, let's get one thing straight. It's Daylight "Saving" Time, not Daylight "Savings" Time. No "S". Adjective versus verb. Got it? Great:)

Deborah's Military Leadership

One of the most famous aspects of Deborah's story is her role in leading the Israelites in the military campaign against the Canaanites general Sisera. Under her guidance, the Israelite forces, led by Barack, one of the significant victories over the Canaanites at the battle of Mount Tabor. Sisera, the Canaanite general, played the ball and sought refuge in the tent of a woman name jail where he was eventually killed.

Upon receiving instructions from God. Deborah called Barack, an Israelite warrior, to bring 10,000 troops Mount Tabor to attack Sisera, Jabin's commander of troops.

Barack responded by saying, if you will go with me I will go if not I will not go (Judges 4:8) in the next verse Deborah agrees to go to battle with Barack and the troops but shares with him, "however, there will be no glory for you in the course you are taking but then the Lord will deliver Sisera into the hands of a woman." (Judges 4:9).

Judge and warrior Deborah went off to battle with Barack, and, as foretold in prophecy, Cicero bell at the hands of a woman but not Deborah. Rather it was Jael, the wife of clan leader, who would avenge the Israelites by driving a tent peg through Sisera's head with a mallet when he asked for water and respect.

Biblical commentaries and scholars disagree on Barack's acceptance of Deborah's battle leadership some feel that Barack respected her as a leader and properties and willingly heeded her call. Others, however, concluded that with his response and judges 4:8 pointed to his discomfort and taking orders from a woman despite the esteem she held she is held in.

He was an educator, principal, businessman and mentor to many. He was a proud member of the G-Men, having played football for Coach Eddie Robinson.

Norma Bellard Duell was an active member of St. Francis Xavier Catholic Church, serving faithfully as the Leader of the Lectors and as a result, helped found the Annual Women's retreat. She was also a member of Moms who PUSH (Pray Until Something Happens). She was a proud 1966 graduate of Southern University and A&M College, Baton Rouge in Education. She was also an educator, having been named West Baton Rouge Parish Teacher of the Year 1990 and an advocate for vocational education.

Both Paul and Norma believed in the value of education, given their experiences growing up in a segregated society. They both worked tirelessly to bring together people of all races, faiths, and backgrounds to improve their community, the State of Louisiana and our country through their active engagement in many organizations including their church homes. They often recruited students to attend both Southern University and A&M College and Grambling State University, so it is fitting that their daughters, Paula Duell Northern and Stephanie Duell honor them through this Memorial Scholarship Fund

Fourth Sunday of Lent Saying, Doing, or Being?

St. Paul tells us in his letter to the Ephesians that we are saved through grace: God's actions of sending his Son to die for us, and raising Jesus from the dead show the love God has for us. It comes entirely from God. We are saved by our faith in Jesus, but even that faith comes from God. So when Paul says that no one can boast about being saved, he means that we can't add up our good deeds like reward points for heaven. He also means that we can't brag about our faith because we can recite the creed or answer an altar call. So if being saved is not a matter of saying the right things, or doing good deeds, what is it?

The answer comes from the gospel. Jesus tells us that he will be lifted up, or crucified, so that we can believe in him and have eternal life. Notice he doesn't give a list of facts about God that we are required to believe. When we "believe in" someone, we put our love and trust in that person. We want to be with that person as much as we can. We know that we are loved and so respond by giving love. Our response of love is not just a happy feeling. It inspires us to stop being selfish and start noticing that others need our help. Jesus describes it as living in the light: we are not ashamed to help someone, forgive someone, or comfort someone. While we do not force our faith on others, we don't hide it either. Our life is in the light, open to anyone who wants to see what God has done for us.

That brings us back to the question about salvation: it is not something we do or say. It is what God does for us. Our response of faith is also his gift. So when we recognize all that God has done for us and believe in his Son Jesus, the Spirit will guide us to live that faith and share it with others.
