23 16th Sunday in Ordinary Time

In our last article in the bulletin for July 16, 2023 we see how the gifts of the Holy Spirit and receiving Jesus Christ in the Eucharist, empowers us, the temple in which they dwell. We, who receives them, can be used as Jesus' instruments in carrying out his mission to change what most Catholics believe about the Eucharist. This week's article we will discuss ways to reinvigorate worship.

This is the task of local parishes in this year of Parish Revival, to revive their parishioners in their love with Jesus in the Eucharist and to send them forth to share this love with others. "Man should tremble, the world should quake, and all Heaven should be deeply moved when the Son of God appears on the altar in the hands of the priest." (St. Francis of Assisi)

After the Resurrection, Jesus approaches two despairing disciples on the road to Emmaus. After encountering them, he reminds them. "Oh, how foolish you are! How slow of heart to believe all that the prophets spoke!" (Lk 24:25). Then he interprets the Scriptures, explaining to them how the Prophets had foretold the Messiah's suffering and how it would lead to him entering into glory. Their hearts burned within them while he spoke, but they did not recognize him until "he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them" (Lk 24:30)

For us, too, the Eucharist makes us capable of seeing and believing in our Resurrected Lord. Through the liturgy, we are guaranteed an encounter with Jesus. "Christian faith is either an encounter with him alive, or it does not exist" (*Desiderio Desideravi, no. 10*) Thus, we have become sharers of God's inmost life. Invited into the perfect communion of love between the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

All members of the Church-ordained ministers and the faithful- enter into and should be formed by the Liturgy. "we are required every day to rediscover the beauty of the rhythm of the Christian celebration Effort must also be made to encourage a sense of community within the parish, above all in the common celebration of the Sunday Mass. The beauty of the Liturgy should engender in us wonder, which leads to adoration. *Year of Parish Revival*

We continue with the minor prophet, Habakkuk

Habakkuk was a prophet who likely lived at the same time as Zephaniah and Jeremiah. Historians estimate he likely "prophesied a short time before the Babylonian invasions of Judah, which began in 605 B.C. Habakkuk watched with horror as the people of Judah became more and more unrighteous, but he was even more horrified when God used an even more unrighteous nation (Babylon) to judge them through the exile. God's answers to Habakkuk's questions provided insight and encouragement for Habakkuk and the righteous remnant in Judah, and those words preserved in the book of Habakkuk continue to do the same for believers today.



Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

A Mighty God

The first reading says that God's might is the basis for divine justice. We might take this to mean that God uses mighty power to punish sinners, in the legal sense of justice. But the reading also talks about God's lenience and clemency. So maybe God's power is so great that punishment is not necessary. Sinners can be forgiven. After all, we usually punish those we fear will hurt us again. But God is too powerful to be injured by our sins. God can afford to wait for us to repent. That is the point of the parable of the wheat and the weeds.

We are used to expecting swift justice. We like TV shows in which the bad guy is caught and convicted in an hour. The idea of God giving sinners until the end of time to repent is almost un-American—at least, until we realize that we are sinners, too. “But my sins are so minor.” Even the smallest sin says that we know better than God what is right. Yet God is still willing to wait for all of us to repent.

On the other hand, we hear people who say they don't deserve to be forgiven. True, but no one could ever deserve forgiveness. That is the wonder of God's love, that God's Son came to die for sinners, even before we sinned. As we experience that forgiveness, we learn the depth of God's love for us. Hopefully, we also learn to share that love with others.

Of course, that means that we also share forgiveness with others. If God waits till “the end of the age” before burning the weeds, shouldn't we be willing to forgive those who hurt us? The Church encourages us to celebrate the sacrament of reconciliation often. Many people today wait till they have a lot of sins, or at least one whopper, to confess. But the more often we go, the more we are reminded of God's love and forgiveness. Those reminders can help us to be more willing to show mercy ourselves. Let us ask God for the courage to seek forgiveness and the strength to forgive.
